

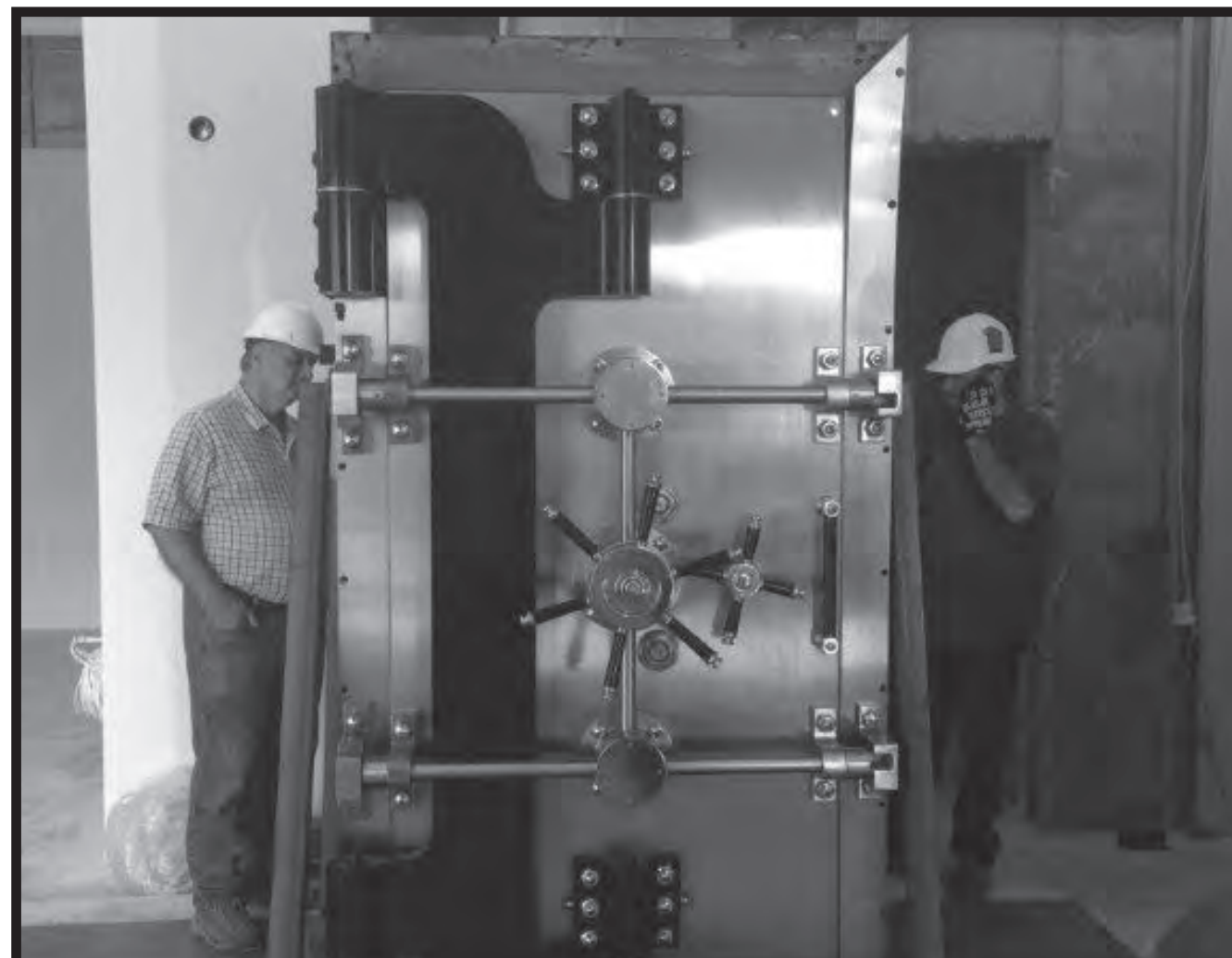
SAFE DEPOSIT VAULT

This vault door was manufactured by Herring-Hall-Marvin between 1930 – 1935 in Hamilton, Ohio. Herring-Hall-Marvin is known for its quality and engineering. During both world wars, Herring-Hall-Marvin produced equipment for the armed services. During World War II, they specifically built gun mounts for the U. S. Navy.

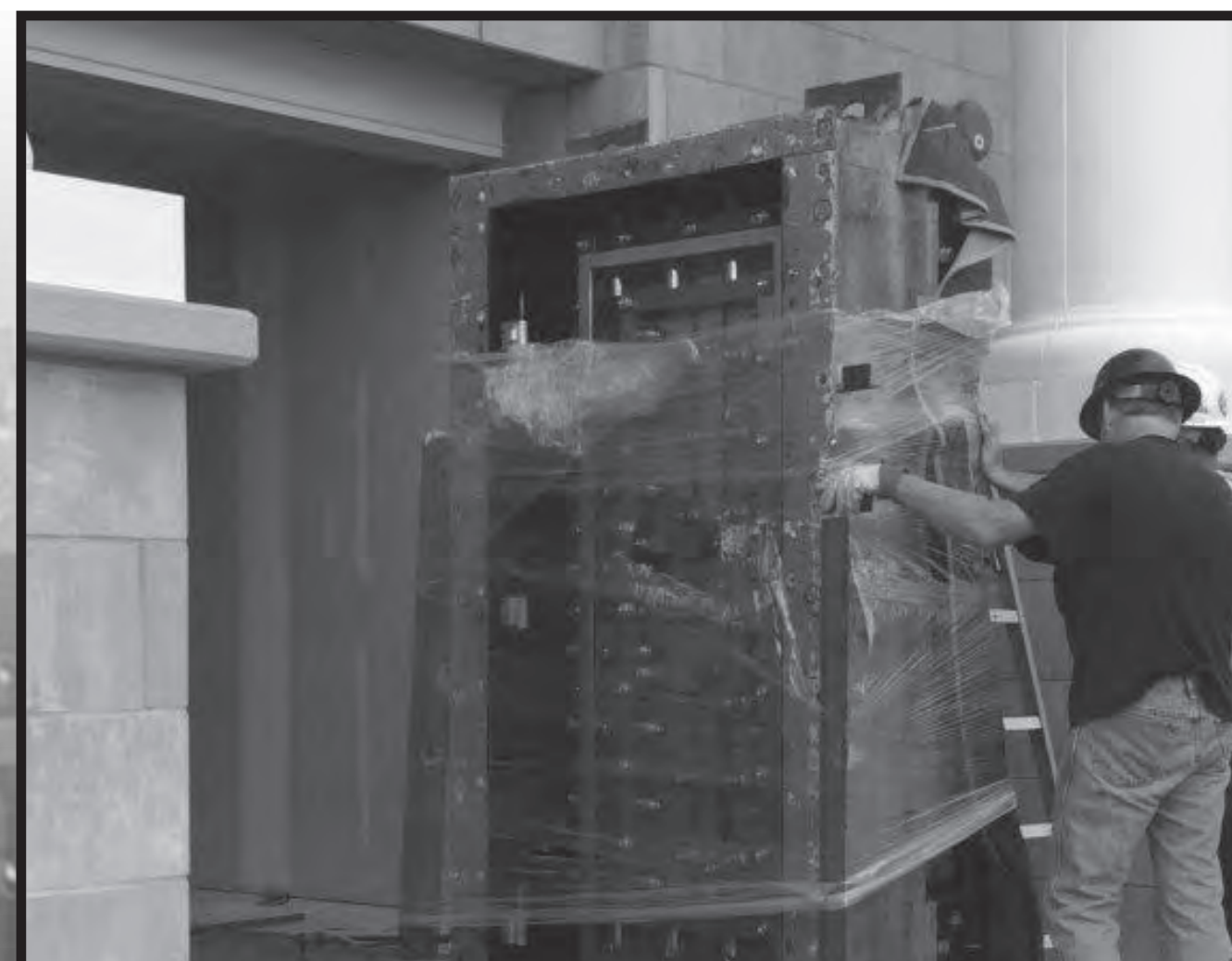
The Herring-Hall-Marvin Company was a consolidation of Hall Safe & Lock Co., Cincinnati; Marvin Safe Co., New York City; Farrel & Co., Philadelphia and Meyers & Smith, Philadelphia (all 4 companies originating from the 1830s) and came in to being as a single entity 1892 until it was acquired by Diebold in 1959.

In 2015, this door was rebuilt for us. The restoration including disassembly, refinishing, reassembly, refitting of all parts took over 118 hours. The architraves were polished, the time locks were rebuilt, the door was hand polished and the brass plating was re-applied to the bolts, gears, hinge tips and other various parts. Also, the pressure system was inspected and adjusted, and the combination locks were rebuilt.

With proper care the door will last another 100 years.
